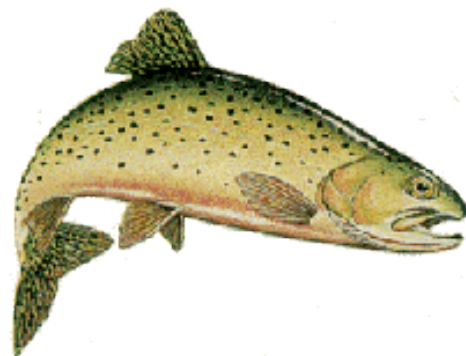

JANUARY SPEAKER BOB KRUMM



Bob Krumm was born in Michigan. He caught his first fish, a carp, when he was five years old and the fishing bug has not let up since then. He attended Albion College and graduated with a degree in biology. He obtained a masters degree in zoology with wildlife management emphasis from the University of Wyoming.

His first guide seasons were in northwest Wyoming: Jackson Hole and the Snake River as well as Pinedale with the Green and New Fork Rivers.

Bob worked for the Wyoming Department of Environmental Quality from 1979 to 1985. After he resigned from DEQ he went back to guiding, this time on the Bighorn River in Montana. Bob has guided on the Bighorn River ever since, though he did spend the first half of the 1987 guide season in Freeport, Maine as a fly fishing instructor in the L.L. Bean Fly Fishing School.

Bob has taught fly-casting and fly tying at Sheridan College and has been active in the Federation of Fly Fishers and Trout Unlimited.

Bob has been fortunate to have worked as a fisheries biologist for the Quemquemtreu Ranch, near San Martin de los Andes in Argentina. He has traveled to New Zealand to fish for trout and to Abaco Island and Andros Island in the Bahamas to fish for bonefish. He has fished for northern pike, lake trout, and walleyed pike in Alberta and Saskatchewan.

Still, Bob believes that some of the best fishing in the world is on the Bighorn River in Montana.

Member Profile: Doyle Gary Evers, DDS

Gary was born in Rome, Georgia in 1948. His family moved about a lot when he was young. They stayed in North Alabama and Georgia until he was in the second grade. They then moved to Iowa while there he attended school in grades three through six. Then they were off to Florida while he attended grades six to nine. The family then moved to California while Gary was in the ninth grade. He graduated from Hayward High School in 1966. In 1970 Gary earned a Zoology degree from Cal. He then attended dental school at Creighton Dental School in Omaha, Nebraska graduating in 1974.

While Gary was going to school he worked several jobs including the delivering of hand bills, lawn mowing, a fry & grill cook, an ice cream soda jerk, a chauffeur, a sporting goods fishing clerk, a laboratory technician, a phlebotomist and was a research subject.

After dental school he joined the US Public Health Service, Indian Health Service and worked in Phoenix and the surrounding Yavapai, Pima and Papago areas as an itinerant Dentist. He also worked for the North Idaho Clinic from Lapwai serving the communities of the North Idaho Native Americans up to the Canadian Border. Indian Health Service USPHS brought Gary to Idaho; He has been a general practice dentist in Lewiston since 1978. He is a Member of the Idaho State Dental Association, American Dental Association and served as trustee for two terms and served as ISDA President in 2000.

DR's Bill Chetwood and Dennis Riendeau brought Gary to his first Clearwater Fly Casters' meeting some time in the late 1970's. He has been a member ever since. He was Prevaricator Supreme in 1989 with a lot of help from the other officers who were local to Pullman and Moscow. With Sylvia's help, they have supported the club through our auctions and raffle donations. Most of his conservation efforts have been hunting and habitat related with several organizations and the Idaho Department of Fish and Game as well.

Fishing Places: The St Joe River and tributaries, Silver Creek, Sullivan's Pond, Amber Lake, Grande Ronde River, Tucannon lakes, and just about any new place he can fish with some success.

Favorite Flies: Air BC, Clark's Stone Fly, EUB, Black Wooley Buggers, Copper Cripple, Marabou Damsel nymphs, "Half a Chicken flies" with steel leaders for fish with big sharp teeth salt or fresh water.

Favorite Memory: as told by Gary

My son Charlie stomping in the house at three years old informing Sylvia through blue lips, "WE DIDN'T CATCH 6 FISH, BECAUSE DAD'S HANDS GOT COLD!" It was a late November Saturday and we were returning from Mann Lake about 3 miles from our home in Lewiston Orchards and Charlie had been catching my "limit" of 6 trout on some previous outings. The wind was creating white caps. My youngest Daughter Lisa at 4 years of age catching a tagged IDFG 5 dollar rainbow in Mann Lake much to the Chagrin of Charlie who had progressed to finding things under rocks 2 years later. Oldest Daughter Suzanne catching fish with Dad on Weitas Creek after inadvertently driving down Lean Too Ridge with the Toyota land cruiser station wagon rear window stuck open. The Cheeto's were dusty. We laughed.

Favorite realization: Sylvia has enjoyed preparing interesting food from the wild game and fish meats he brings home. According to Gary the out doors has been a near banquet ever since.

Favorite Knowledge: When you are in the wild places of Idaho what matters most is where you put your foot down next. Gary says, "If you don't like it, do not go there!"

Volunteer activities: Gary's conservation efforts over the years have been quite participation at public hearings and rather heavy participation in conservation groups. He was a committee member for the Lewiston Chapter Ducks Unlimited. Is a charter committee Member for Lewis & Clark Chapter #5 Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation and a life member of that organization. He is a member of National Wild Turkey Federation, Pheasants Forever, Trout Unlimited, Lewis and Clark Wildlife Club, Pomeroy Gun Club and National Skeet Shooting Association. He is also a life member of the Lewiston Gun Club. He enjoys working on Idaho Fish and Game Projects particularly on the Salmon, Snake or Craig Mountain areas. He has served as Cub Scout and BSA assistant and a Starter for the Lewis and Clark Neptune Swim Team. He has Brittany Spaniels and hunt chukars when he is not hunting something else. He loves hunting big fish or small stream trout fishing. There is nothing like the strike of a saltwater game fish. In his next lifetime Gary says that he will spend more time on oceans and estuaries. Gary has climbed Mount Borah, Mount Hood, Mount Rainier, Mount Crosson, Buffalo Hump and Fremont Peak and several high places incidental to where I was fishing, hunting, back packing or hiking. FLY OF THE MONTH CADDIS EMERGER



Materials:

- Hook: #18 standard dry
- Tail/Shuck: Ginger Z-lon, sparse
- Thread: Olive
- Abdomen: Olive Hare-tron
- Thorax: Olive Hare-tron
- Wing: Short deer hair

Directions: Attach thread to the hook and wind down the shank to the bend. Tie in sparse Z-lon tail/shuck - I used 1/2 a 'hank', and tried to make sure the ends were uneven lengths. Over all length of tail is around 3/4 shank length. Add dubbing for the abdomen, tapering it slightly, and dub up to about 2/3 of the way towards the eye. Tie in a small clump of deer hair after you remove the underfur and even the tips. This should ideally extend from the tie-in point to just about even with the hook point or maybe the barb. The length of mine varied a bit, depending on which football game was on tv and how many beers and been consumed while helping 'my' team. Trim the deer hair butts, and then add a bit more dubbing, and cover the butt ends of the deer hair, whip finishing just behind the eye. If any long pieces of rabbit guard hairs were sticking out over the eye, I left them as 'broken antennae'. I haven't tried this particular fly yet, but intend to in the spring, fishing it in or just under the surface film.
