February Program:

“Lessons Learned in America’s Wildest Classroom” a presentation by Ed Krumpe

Ed Krumpe is a professor emeritus of natural resource management in the College of Natural Resources at the University of Idaho. He taught courses and conducted research in wilderness and wild and scenic river management, planning, and public involvement for 36 years. Recently he worked with the River Management Society (RMS) to develop suggested core competencies for professionals working in river management. He actively works with the Selway Bitterroot Frank Church Foundation which involves citizens in conducting wilderness and river stewardship.

After a career of working for 40 years with University of Idaho’s Taylor Wilderness Research Station in the heart of the Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness, retired professor Ed Krumpe will share some observations on four decades of change in fish, wildlife, forest fire, and managing the most destructive species in the woods -- humans.

Clearwater Fly Casters is a group who enjoy fly fishing and seek to encourage others in their pursuit of the sport and to perpetuate fly fishing through education and conservation activities, both for members of the club and for the community at large. Scholarship Awards will be announced at the May meeting of the club.

The Clearwater Fly Casters Scholarship Fund has awarded over \$16,000 in the past 5 years to graduate and undergraduate students in studies of fisheries and fishery management. Past recipients have been from the University of Idaho, Washington State University and Eastern Washington University. Lewis and Clark State College students are also eligible to participate. Research by these students benefits not only fish, but also enhances the economics of the Pacific Northwest.

Conservation Committee: Columbia River Gillnets

On Friday, January 17, Oregon suspended its participation in the joint state [Policy Review Committee](#) (PRC). The PRC has been heavily biased by pro-gillnet Commissioners from both states, which led to a vote last February to recommend restoring year-round gillnetting to the mainstem Columbia River – an alarming recommendation that the Washington Fish and Wildlife Commission subsequently voted to adopt last March in Spokane. WDFW’s leadership has acknowledged that the Spokane vote killed the agency’s fee increase proposal and Columbia River endorsement reauthorization during the 2019 legislative session.

Oregon’s decision to walk away from the PRC is positive. It may signal a shift in Oregon’s policy on Columbia River gillnets following major turnover on the Oregon Commission – another welcome development. Unfortunately, some members of the Washington Commission continue their efforts to push Oregon to match Washington’s position of year-round mainstem gillnetting. During Friday’s session, comments were made by Commissioners (and PRC Members) [Bob Kehoe](#) and [Donald McIsaac](#) (click links for video) defending the policy that was adopted in Spokane. Furthermore, they urged WDFW Director Kelly Susewind to reduce the popular spring Chinook recreational fishery by pursuing more mainstem gillnetting this year. Remember, there has been no mainstem gillnet fishery for spring Chinook since 2016.

On Saturday, [fireworks were evident](#) between different Commissioners as Kehoe and McIsaac pushed for a letter to Oregon asking them to reconsider their decision to suspend the PRC. The Commission will be discussing the Columbia River reforms again during its [regular meeting in Olympia on Friday, February 7 at 11:20 am](#), including a [draft letter](#) that was written by Commissioner Kehoe.

We had hoped that the Washington Commission and WDFW would pull back from their alarming efforts to restore year-round Columbia River mainstem gillnet fisheries, but recent developments don’t look promising. This is unfortunate given the poor health of Columbia River salmon and steelhead populations. At the same time, the agency faces a major budget shortfall and is asking the legislature for an additional \$26 million.

The Columbia River Endorsement alone generated over \$1.5 million for WDFW each year, which doesn’t account for the license fee revenue. By comparison, WDFW receives about \$145,000 in annual revenue from the entire Columbia/Grays Harbor/Willapa gillnet fleet. Over 200,000 anglers purchased the Columbia River Salmon and Steelhead Endorsement while there are only nine gillnetters who land more than \$20,000 of annual ex-vessel value in Columbia River salmon fisheries.

Materials:

Hook: Partridge CZ/SHR

Thread: Semperfli Waxed Thread 8/0 Black

Weight: Matte Black Tungsten Bead

Tail: Ice Blue Flashabou

Body: Blue Polish Quill

Wing Case: 6 fibers of Pheasant Tail

Thorax: Tan Opposum dubbing

Legs: Ice Blue Flashabou

UV Resin: Solarez Bone Dry on the body,
Solarez Thin and Firemist Blue on the wing case
